# Theta Chi celebrates 100 years at 528 Beacon Street

During the weekend of September 30 to October 2, approximately 95 alumni and guests were able to celebrate the momentous occasion of Theta Chi living at 528 Beacon Street for over 100 years.

Between 1919 and 1922, Theta Chi resided at 161 Bay State Road. According to a newsletter circulated to all alumni at the time, this house was "one of the poorest at Tech considering location, size, and appointments." Therefore, in 1922, the members of the Theta Chi Trust (the predecessor of the current Beta Chapter Corporation) faced the choice of renting a new building, building a new house, or purchasing an existing house. As we all know, they elected to buy 528 Beacon Street. The purchase price was \$40,000, which was considered "rea-

sonable given that [the] house alone cost over \$60,000 to build." For reference, in 2022 dollars, the chapter house would have cost just over \$700,000.

The weekend began with an informal reception, with many alumni from the 1960s to 2020s in attendance. The undergraduates were eager to show visiting alumni all the renovations that have been completed over the last 10 years, including a totally rebuilt roof deck and brand-new third-floor bathrooms and showers. On Saturday, a small group of dedicated alumni toured the MIT campus. One of the newest additions to MIT is the nanotechnology laboratories.

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# **Paul Tompkins Fundraiser announcement**

Some sad news to report: on Friday, February 4, 2022, Paul Tompkins '92 died from injuries sustained during a scuba diving accident in British Columbia. On February 6, he would have turned 52 years old. Paul graduated from MIT with a degree in Course 16, and later earned a master's degree from Stanford University in 1997. Never quite done with his academic pursuits, he earned a second master's degree, followed by a Ph.D. in 2005 from Carnegie-Mellon University in Robotics. Paul's love of space exploration led to a stellar career which included employment at Hughes Space and Communications from 1992 to1998, Stinger Ghaffarian Technologies (NASA AMES) from 2005 to 2010, SpaceX from 2010 to 2019, and Blue Origin from 2020 to 2022. Paul achieved academic and professional excellence and was consistently recognized and awarded for his intellectual contributions and innovative problem-solving skills. Paul also enjoyed the outdoors and exploring. He was an avid mountain climber. His feats include summiting Mt. Rainier, Denali (formerly known as Mount McKinley), Mt. Robson, Volcan Cotopaxi (Ecuador), and Cholatse (Nepal). He also earned

a private pilot's license in 2018, and after moving to Seattle in 2020, he took up scuba diving.

Paul leaves behind a legacy of a life well lived with passion, humor, and grace. Paul was a happy man and he loved his life. Countless friends and colleagues have expressed their joy in having known him. He will be greatly missed. During the commencement weekend this year (which would have been Paul's 30th graduation reunion

weekend), his pledge brothers gathered to celebrate Paul's life and set up several donations in his memory. Collectively, \$73,000 from 73 donors has been raised so far for the World Wildlife Fund in Paul's honor. Theta Chi alumni have also initiated conversations with MIT to raise over \$100,000 for the Department



of Aeronautics and Astronautics in support of their Small Satellite (SmallSat) Center, which aims to educate future aerospace engineers on the design and implementation of small satellites in support of our space systems. The hope is that the \$100,000 (or

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by special guests from the MIT Division of Student Life and several representatives from the International Headquarters and Grand Chapter of MIT. Toward the end of the dinner, the Grand Chapter presented Beta Chapter with a formal commendation of 100 years of residence at 528 Beacon Street. They also gifted the chapter an original brick from the Old South Barracks of Norwich University, where Theta Chi was founded.

On Sunday, Ryan Andrews' 10 and Ricky Ramirez' 09 finally ended their 2008–2009 midnight snack war, with both sides acknowledging that Ricky cooks higher quality food, but Ryan cooks a larger quantity of food. It

was left undecided as to which was ultimately better for the brotherhood. With these wounds finally healed, they combined forces to cook a copious amount of high-quality brunch food, which was enjoyed by all.

Overall, the weekend was a great success, and we encourage all alumni to consider returning to the chapter house soon! While the final date has yet to be set, alumni weekend 2023 is tentatively scheduled for the last weekend in April; a formal announcement will come soon.

The actives were wonderful hosts and great partners for the 100th celebration planning team led by Chapter Advisor Ryan Andrews '10.

And some work for the future. Fortunately, 528 Beacon Street has "good bones" like so many of the residences built during the Gilded Age in Boston's Back Bay. However, this does not mean that we can rest on our laurels with respect to upkeep and maintenance! Over the last five to 10 years, MIT has been aggressively renovating its dormitories. The new dorm rooms are much more spacious and modern-looking, and they have amenities closer to those of luxury apartment buildings than the dormitories that most of us remember. To secure our future as a residential fraternity, we need to ensure that our chapter house remains a "steal" in the sense of providing undergraduates with a safe, clean, and

functional home while costing considerably less than the room and board costs that MIT now charges.

To that end, while the regular donor appeals will not be as frequent now that the campaign is ending, please be aware that there are least two major future projects at 528 Beacon Street. First, we will be coordinating with MIT and the Association of Independent Living Groups (AILG) in a system-wide effort to replace the sprinklers at 528 Beacon Street and all the other Back Bay fraternities. Our sprinklers were installed over 30 years ago, so their replacement is long overdue. Relatedly, the second major project is upgrading all the fire alarm equipment at the chapter house. The timeline for both these projects is still uncertain, but we anticipate that they will begin within the next three years. These projects will be funded by alumni donations to Theta Chi, as well as grants from the MIT Independent Residence Development Fund (IRDF). If you donate to MIT, earmarking a portion for the IRDF is very welcome and will ultimately benefit Theta Chi.
