Beta/MIT Celebrates Chapter House Centennial

From September 30–October 2, 2022, nearly 100 brothers of Beta Chapter and guests gathered together to celebrate 100 years of their chapter house—a century of brotherhood in the same four walls of its beloved brownstone at 528 Beacon

Street. Rain and cloudy skies didn't put a damper on the festivities in Boston.

The weekend began with an informal reception, with alumni from the 1960s–2020s in attendance. Collegians were eager to show visiting alumni all the renovations that had been completed over the past 10 years, including a totally rebuilt roof deck and brand-new third-floor bathrooms and showers.

On Saturday, a small group of dedicated alumni toured the MIT campus. One of the newest additions to MIT is the nanotechnology laboratories. Outside of the lab space are large mosaics of the MIT Great Dome and the MIT seal. At first glance, these seem purely decorative, but at a closer glance, you will find the names of over 320,000 MIT faculty, staff, students, and alumni who were at MIT from 1861 to November 2020! After the MIT tour, the festivities continued with lunch at a local Mexican restaurant.

The highlight of the weekend was the cocktail hour and dinner at the MIT Lobdell Dining Hall attended by nearly 75 collegians, alumni, and special guests including MIT Associate Dean of Fraternities, Sororities, and Independent Living Groups Liz Jason, Sr. Editor of the MIT News, Alice Dragoon, International Secretary Al Copeland, International Chaplain Dr. James Black, Chief Development Officer John Berghoff, and Rattle Editor Ben Hill. Beta Chapter was represented by brothers ranging from the class of 1957 to the class of 2025.

Richard Nixon '64: Raise the roof!


